A Message from JPAC's Executive Director and Board Chair



Dear Friends,

We are delighted to present JPAC's second annual Legislative Scorecard, reflecting another historic year for Jewish advocacy in our State Capitol.

This year built upon the foundation we laid in 2024, when we released our first scorecard and set a new standard for transparency, accountability, and partnership between California's Jewish community and our elected leaders. Since then, the urgency and impact of our work have only deepened.

In 2025, California made history with the passage and implementation of AB 715 (Zbur, Addis) – JPAC's sponsored and landmark law to counter antisemitism and hate in K-12 schools. This first-in-the-nation legislation established a statewide Antisemitism Prevention Coordinator and ensures that Jewish students receive the same protections and respect as all other vulnerable groups. The success of AB 715 – achieved through unprecedented bipartisan support, coalition organizing, and public engagement – demonstrates the power of our community when we unite for justice and safety.

Beyond AB 715, JPAC continued to advance policies rooted in Jewish values and solidarity. Together with our (now) 41 member organizations, we championed legislation to fight hunger and poverty, expand Holocaust and genocide education, strengthen mental health supports, improve immigrant services, and protect reproductive and LGBTQ+ rights. We also secured millions in state funding for community safety, Holocaust survivor services, and programs to support domestic violence survivors – ensuring that compassion and protection remain central to California's values.

We are grateful for our partners in the California Legislative Jewish Caucus, whose leadership and advocacy continue to drive our priorities forward. We also commend Governor Gavin Newsom for his commitment to our community – exemplified through the continued implementation of his Golden State Plan to Counter Antisemitism, the most comprehensive state response to antisemitism in U.S. history.

JPAC's second scorecard reflects a growing movement – one that recognizes our community's dual responsibility to stand up for ourselves and to stand with others. Together, we are shaping a safer, more just, and more equitable California for all.

A coalition of 41 leading Jewish community organizations across the state, JPAC advocates in Sacramento on behalf of the Jewish community's concerns and broadly shared values. Our member organizations – including Jewish Federations, Jewish Community Relations Councils, Jewish Family Service agencies, and others – collectively serve hundreds of thousands of Californians of all backgrounds and represent the interests of California's 1.2 million Jews, making us the largest single-state coalition of Jewish organizations in the nation.

Since 2022, JPAC has successfully advocated for over \$450 million dollars from the state budget for a wide range of community projects, including enhancing community security initiatives, rebuilding Jewish summer camps destroyed in wildfires, expanding our Holocaust education institutions, and securing vital resources for seniors, immigrants, and people experiencing food insecurity.

We have helped pass crucial legislation to counter antisemitism and hate; expand mental health, anti-poverty, and anti-hunger initiatives; and support immigrants and older adults. And we led the advocacy efforts to help the state adopt an ethnic studies curriculum without antisemitic content.

JPAC uses our community's collective strength and reach to build the world we want to live in – for ourselves and for all Californians.

Under the leadership of co-chairs Assemblymember Jesse Gabriel and Senator Scott Wiener, the California Legislative Jewish Caucus has emerged as a force in the California statehouse. Formed just over a decade ago with four lawmakers, it now boasts 18 members – making it the third-largest diversity caucus in the Legislature. Twelve legislators identify as Jewish, and six have a strong Jewish familial or personal connection.

JPAC works hand in glove with the Jewish Caucus to advance the greatest needs of California’s Jewish community. In 2025, the Caucus led the charge on JPAC’s top priority, making **AB 715 (Zbur, Addis)** their singular **legislative priority**. Every member poured remarkable time, heart, and political capital into passing this first-in-the-nation law to counter antisemitism in K-12 schools.

Jewish Caucus members individually championed several other JPAC priorities to strengthen Holocaust and genocide education, protect vulnerable communities, and ensure continued state funding for community safety and social services.

A strong Jewish Caucus remains critical to the success of our priorities. We are deeply grateful for their partnership, advocacy, and leadership in ensuring that California continues to be a national model for fighting hate and advancing justice for all communities.

The State maintained its record investment in nonprofit security grants, extended support for the last generation of Holocaust survivors at risk of losing vital services, and provided critical resources for domestic violence programs and homelessness prevention.

AB 715 **Becomes Law**

A Historic Step to Protect Jewish Students Across California

This year, we passed AB 715 – our landmark bill to protect students from antisemitism and hate in California's K-12 schools. After **two years** of organizing, advocacy, and coalition building, AB 715 overcame fierce opposition and earned overwhelming bipartisan support – becoming the **most consequential bill** in JPAC's history.

Assemblymembers Rick Chavez Zbur and Dawn Addis led with extraordinary dedication as authors of the bill, backed by the unwavering leadership of the California Legislative Jewish Caucus – which made this their singular priority. While powerful interest groups in Sacramento spread misinformation to undermine the bill, the commitment of our champions ensured AB 715 crossed the finish line.

What AB 715 Does

Amidst a **623% surge** in antisemitic incidents in California K-12 schools in the past decade, the new law creates the nation's first statewide Antisemitism Prevention Coordinator to develop antisemitism trainings for educators, track incidents, guide accountability, and recommend future reforms. It also requires schools to respond swiftly to incidents and build safer, more inclusive school environments so that Jewish students – and all students – can learn without fear.

When AB 715 faced a significant hurdle ahead of a key Senate committee vote, Senate Leader McGuire and Committee Chair Senator Pérez issued a joint statement with the Jewish Caucus chairs committing to "working overtime...to send an antisemitism bill to the Governor by the end of this year's legislative session." They followed through on that commitment – becoming deeply engaged, directly facilitating negotiations over the next two months, and ultimately delivering on their promise, with the Senate passing AB 715 on a 35-0 vote. Assembly Speaker Rivas likewise delivered when the bill reached his house, securing a 71-0 vote in the Assembly.

As Majority Leader of the Assembly and Vice Chair of the Legislative Women's Caucus, Assemblymember Aguiar-Curry authored a major bill to expand reproductive health and patient privacy – gaining support from her entire caucus and passing it into law.

Senator Arreguín's early, strong support for AB 715 in the face of significant pressure from special interest groups created space for colleagues to sign on. On the Senate floor, he emphasized the importance of intergroup solidarity and highlighted how the Jewish community has shown up for other vulnerable communities.

As Vice Chair of the Latino Caucus, Assemblymember Carrillo was an early co-author to the precursor of AB 715, and he didn't waver amidst immense pressure. He urged colleagues to back AB 715, and spoke powerfully on the Assembly floor in support of the bill, helping to ensure its passage.

Assemblymember Jackson chaired the Select Committee on Racism, Hate, and Xenophobia, where he invited JPAC to participate in a powerful intergroup conversation. His remarks, early support for AB 715, and continued engagement in JPAC events reflect his steadfast support for issues of importance to the Jewish community.

Senate Leader-elect Limón has always had a great working relationship with JPAC and the Jewish community. She is present at events, accessible to our community, and a perennial 100% voter on JPAC priorities – including strong support for AB 715. We are thrilled for her tenure as Senate Leader, and we look forward to our continued work together.

The State Budget included \$83.8 million for Home Safe to prevent homelessness among some of California's most vulnerable populations. Senator Menjivar was a key champion in securing this funding. She has also been a consistent supporter of the social service programs prioritized by JPAC, authoring five JPAC priority bills over the past three years.

As Vice Chair of the Senate Education committee, Senator Ochoa Bogh has long supported bills to protect Jewish students. This year, she helped secure key votes to pass AB 715 out of committee, and she spoke out forcefully in support of the bill on the Senate floor. She was also a strong voice against attacks on JPAC by the California Faculty Association.

Assemblymember Patel has remained unequivocal about real threats facing Jewish students – sharing powerful anecdotes from her district and from her experience as school board president. She is often the first to reach out when incidents arise. As the author of JPAC priority bill AB 237, she selflessly joined efforts to pass a strong SB 19.

COUNTERING ANTISEMITISM

Governor Newsom continued to implement his Golden State Plan to Counter Antisemitism – including fulfilling his commitment to sign a major K-12 antisemitism bill, AB 715.

He created this unprecedented whole-of-society plan at the request of, and in partnership with, JPAC. He unveiled it at JPAC Capitol Summit in 2024.



STATE FUNDING

Governor Newsom included **\$80 million in nonprofit security grant funding** in his January budget proposal – the first time this program has been included so early in the budget negotiation process. It remained in the final budget, fulfilling the second year of a two-year commitment for security grants.

Governor Newsom has directed **\$480 million** in state funds to JPAC priorities since taking office in 2019, including \$315 million for security grants.

SCORED LEGISLATION 2025

JPAC sponsored three bills – including AB 715 – and supported an additional 24 bills that further our policy priorities and support the work of our member organizations.

We have chosen to score 13 bills this year, split into two categories: **Countering Antisemitism & Hate** and **Supporting Vulnerable Communities**. Sponsored bills are denoted with an asterisk (*). These bills represent the diverse issues JPAC and California’s Jewish community care about, and will meaningfully impact the lives of Jews and all Californians.

» **Countering Antisemitism & Hate**



***AB 715** (Zbur, Addis) **COUNTERING ANTISEMITISM IN K-12 SCHOOLS**

Counters antisemitism and other forms of discrimination in California’s K-12 schools by giving schools the tools to prevent, identify, and respond to antisemitism; creating an Antisemitism Prevention Coordinator to train educators and school leaders about antisemitism, track incidents, advise on accountability measures, and recommend future legislation; and requiring an annual notification to all schools on the protections, requirements, and responsibilities in this bill.

» *Status: Signed Into Law by Governor Newsom*

NOTE: As JPAC’s top priority, AB 715 votes are weighted at 50% of each legislator’s overall score. Because of the dramatic amendments made to AB 715, only votes made on the final version of the bill are scored – in the last week of the session.



AB 785 (Sharp-Collins) **COMMUNITY VIOLENCE INTERDICTION GRANT PROGRAM**

Establishes a grant program to fund community-driven solutions to decrease violence in neighborhoods and schools. Eligible programs include supportive programs that preemptively reduce and eliminate violence and gang involvement, programs that create recreational opportunities during peak times of violence, health programs that address youth trauma, youth diversion programs, and school-based health centers.

» Status: Held in Senate Appropriations Committee



AB 822 (Elhawary) **COMMISSION ON THE STATE OF HATE**

Extends the sunset repeal date of the existing Commission on State of Hate from 2027 to 2031 – which has undertaken significant work to analyze and address hate crimes and hate incidents in California. JPAC sponsored the 2021 bill (AB 1126, Bloom) that established the Commission.

» Status: Signed Into Law by Governor Newsom



AB 1127 (Gabriel) **KEEPING AUTOMATIC WEAPONS OFF OUR STREETS**

Prohibits the sale of semi-automatic handguns that are easily convertible into a fully automatic machine gun by using a converter attachment.

» Status: Signed Into Law by Governor Newsom



SB 19 (Rubio, Patel) **SAFE SCHOOLS AND PLACES OF WORSHIP ACT**

Prosecutors across California have found it difficult to hold people accountable for making criminal threats against places of worship and other sensitive places unless they identify a specific person in their threat. SB 19 closes this loophole and allows prosecution for threats made against a daycare, school, university, workplace, house of worship, or medical facility.

» Status: Signed Into Law by Governor Newsom



***SB 472** (Stern) **HOLOCAUST AND GENOCIDE EDUCATION**

Implements key recommendations from the Governor’s Council on Holocaust and Genocide Education, expanding accountability, data collection, and a new grant program to increase the teaching of Holocaust and genocide education.

» Status: Signed Into Law by Governor Newsom

» Supporting Vulnerable Communities



AB 260 (Aguiar-Curry) **PROTECTING SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE CARE**
Safeguards access to reproductive and transgender health care, including expanded telehealth for Medi-Cal patients – important for reaching harder to serve populations.

» Status: Signed Into Law by Governor Newsom



AB 1034 (Ávila Farías) **TEACHER MENTAL HEALTH TRAINING**
Ensures teacher-prep programs include youth mental health training before educators enter the classroom.

» Status: Signed Into Law by Governor Newsom



AB 1362 (Kalra) **HUMAN TRAFFICKING PREVENTION AND PROTECTION**
Requires registration and oversight of foreign labor recruiters to protect immigrant workers from wage theft, human trafficking, and other labor violations.

» Status: Signed Into Law by Governor Newsom



SBX1-2 (Wiener) **IMMIGRANT LEGAL SERVICES**

Provides funding for direct legal services for immigrants and other vulnerable Californians at risk of detention, eviction, wage theft, deportation, intimate partner violence, and other actions that may be taken under new federal policies.

» Status: Signed Into Law by Governor Newsom



SB 324 (Menjívar) **MEDI-CAL FROM NONPROFIT PROVIDERS**

Strengthens participation of community-based nonprofits as Medi-Cal providers through adequate funding and red tape reductions.

» Status: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee



SB 411 (Pérez) **NUTRITION BENEFITS FOR LOW-INCOME STUDENTS**

Fights child hunger by creating a single statewide SUN Bucks application website and establishing the BOOST Nutrition benefit to provide food support during school breaks and emergencies.

» Status: Vetoed by Governor Newsom



SB 771 (Stern) **HATE ON SOCIAL MEDIA**

Prohibits social media algorithms from delivering violent, threatening, or harassing content to users of the targeted group. If a social media platform is found in a civil trial to have violated these laws, the bill would increase the financial consequences proportional to the life-and-death stakes.

» Status: Vetoed by Governor Newsom



KEY

All Legislators vote on legislation on the Senate and Assembly floors. However, many critical legislative decisions are responding to pressures at the committee level, where only legislators on those committees can vote. As such, the final position represented on this scorecard is the summary of all positions taken by the lawmaker, indicated as follows:

- Authors and co-authors of a bill are marked in **dark green**, demonstrating their strong support.
- Voting “yes” on all possible votes for a bill (committee, floor, and concurrence) are noted in **green**. These lawmakers demonstrated unwavering support for that JPAC priority bill.
- Voting “no” or abstaining on all possible votes for a bill are noted in **red**. Abstentions are equivalent to a “no” vote in the legislature and are treated equally here. These are votes cast against the Jewish community’s interests.
- Lawmakers who switched their votes (voting “no” or abstaining on some votes and voting “yes” on others) are marked in **yellow**.
- E Lawmakers with an excused absence on the day of a vote and who did not conduct another vote are marked with an **E**.
- Empty boxes indicate that a bill did not make it to the floor, or the lawmaker was not in office at the time of the vote – and that lawmaker did not have the opportunity to vote.
- * Indicates member of the Legislative Jewish Caucus

Score is calculated by dividing the number of “yes” votes by the total number of possible votes (excused absences are not included) for each legislator. **AB 715 is weighted at 50% of the total score.**
